Largo House Access

As spring approaches we are starting to see green shoots emerging. Snowdrops have done their thing and daffs are about to give us all a spring show. There are some amazing displays of both near and around Largo House.

Wouldn't it be lovely if we could persuade the owners of Largo Estate of the benefits to the community of simple path access through parts of the Estate? A path linking Lower Largo and Lundin Links with Upper Largo would be so helpful. There is an existing estate road (called the "Rhododendron Walk" by many) completely overgrown just to the west of Mercury Motors which could be extended by a simple path around Largo House linking with East Drive in Upper Largo. This could provide safe daylight access between the villages plus a possible terrific loop walk by walking down the Serpentine walk. It would also bolster any campaigning for a pedestrian crossing around Mercury Motors which has been considered to service the bus stop.

It would be great if we could have a safe extended walk that could include Lower Largo, the beach, the woods of the Serpentine, then up to the Church in Upper Largo, the views of Largo Bay in front of Largo House, then down through Lundin Links under the iconic viaduct, finally finishing with a pint or a coffee at The Crusoe or The Aurrie. There aren't many one-hour walks that could offer all that variety. We could also pop in and collect our vegetables and flowers from the Largo Estate Gardeners en route.

The link path has been suggested several times to the owners of Largo Estate as a priority. So far, they are citing safety concerns as their main problem. LCT would be delighted to work with Largo Estate to see how this might be addressed. We need to keep up the conversations with Largo Estate, Paths For All as well as local Councillors and the Community Council.

A Wild and Windy Winter

We've certainly had a battering over the last few months, with the stormy weather causing significant disruptions to some of us, and mild inconveniences to others. Whether it's roads being blocked by fallen trees, power-cuts to our homes or even the rough seas getting a bit too close for comfort, it's been a dramatic turn of events.

Out there in the turbulent tides, the Grey Seals have come to the end of their breeding season. Also called Atlantic Seals (Halichoerus grypus), these are the larger of the two species of seals that can be seen, with adult males (bulls) weighing in excess of 200kg and over 2m in length. The smaller Harbour, or 'Common' Seals (Phoca vitulina) are not quite as common as they used to be, with a significant decline in populations seen recently. Another helpful identification tool in addition to size difference is that Grey Seals have a large, broad snout, which is where the Latin name, translated as 'Hooknosed Sea-pig', comes from. Harbour Seals have a much shorter snout, and face-on look more Labrador-like. Harbour Seals also come in a variety of colours and have a habit of lifting their heads and feet in a banana shaped outline whilst at rest.

Both species of seal can be seen hauled out of the water on the rocks at low tide and sometimes they can be incredibly camouflaged amongst the exposed seaweed. It's very important for these animals to have these periods out of the water, to rest, digest their meals and moult their coats. If you're lucky enough to see them basking on the rocks, please enjoy them from a distance by giving them plenty of space and keeping dogs close to heel. Disturbance at these haul-out sites can be considerably detrimental to the welfare of these fantastic animals with whom we share the coast.

Lundin Ladies' Golf Club



The clubhouse

The 9-hole LLGC, formally constituted in 1891, is an independent club with its own clubhouse, course and staff. It has only lady members and is one of the oldest such clubs in existence. Gentlemen can play the course as season ticket holders

and there is currently an active junior section for both girls and boys.

The course, designed by James Braid, plays to par 68 and is 2,365 yards long. The standard nine has seven par 4s and two par 3s.

Two impressive features of the course are Largo Law, an extinct volcano, which dominates the view to the east while the three tall unsculptured and irregularly shaped pillars of red sandstone, which form the most impressive group of Standing Stones in Fife, can be found midway along the second fairway.

Standing Stanes of Lundin

Standing stones are found across the world but the people who built them and why they did so remain mysterious. The group of three red sandstone megaliths on the second fairway of the Lundin Links Ladies Golf Course has been the subject of much debate. A scheduled monument since 1937, the tallest stone measures over five metres in height. The three stones are thought to be of a similar depth below ground. The Old Statistical Account of 1792 noted that there were "fragments of a fourth, which seems to have been of equal magnitude with the other three".

Over the centuries the Lundin stones have been suggested to be: the gravestones of Danish chiefs fallen in battle; of Roman origin; or the remains of a Druid temple. Latest thinking suggests that the stones were part of a larger ceremonial complex dating back to around 3,000 years BCE or earlier. Obviously, the feature was important enough to warrant the huge effort involved in its construction at a time of very limited technology. The stones were built to last and to be seen from a distance. The full facts of their origin and function may never be known, and so the words of this old poem (first published in the *St Andrews Citizen* of 17 August 1895) continue to be fitting:

"How came you here? Who bade you stand? Grim sentinels o'er sea and land? Did grateful nation you uprear, In mem'ry of a patriot dear? Did some repulsed invader sue For leave to lay his slain 'neath you? Or were your sides, in days of yore, Oft stained with sacrificial gore? No picture, symbol, nor a word You bear, to shew what you record: Nor threat nor bribe can make you tell The secret which you keep too well."

Potato Gnocchi

This year I have decided to continue my Celebrating Seasonal Fife programme. There will be posts on Facebook and mentions on other social media sites. It's really just to try and help bring awareness of what is in season in Fife so that we can celebrate it! I have also decided to celebrate the (not so) humble potato as we have two great producers of them locally - Blacketyside and Ardross. Both tell you what the varieties are and it's worth understanding that different varieties have different cooking characteristics. So here is a recipe for March, April, it's for potato gnocchi, which, once made will go with a variety of dressings or sauces. Wild garlic will be available, so do try with that.

My son Byam has a business called Trotter's Independent Condiments.

They make a wild garlic pesto, which works very well.

1 kg floury potatoes

Desiree, red Duke of York, King Edward or my favourite Manitou available at Blacketyside.


200g plain flour

3 egg yolks

Salt and pepper

- Peel and cook the potatoes in boiling water or steam them.
- Drain and return to hob over a low heat to really dry them out.
- Mash thoroughly or pass through a ricer.
- Make a well in the middle and incorporate the egg yolks, flour and seasoning and work into a ball.
- Cut into 4 and then using lots of flour roll out into a "rope" then cut into 2-3 cm lengths.
- You can then roll them gently on a flour coated fork to give ridges which when cooked help to take up any sauce. Remember the flour prevents sticking.
- Bring a pan of salted water to the boil and drop the gnocchi in and when they come to the surface they will be cooked. Lift out and drain, toss in your chosen sauce.

Fete at Largo House

A splendid ball and supper was given at Largo House on the 18th Instant, at which upwards of eighty distinguished individuals were present. At One, the party sat down to an elegant supper; After which, dancing resumed, and kept up with great spirit till Five in the morning. The General (Durham) and his Lady were not, in the meantime, forgetful of the comforts and amusements of their poorer neighbours. A scaffolding was erected around the house, to enable them to feast their eyes with a view of the splendid interior; And that their other senses may be gratified, a comfortable supper was provided for them in Lee's Inn. Such attentions as these, mark a considerate liberality, and deserve to be recorded.

Note: Lee's Inn is now the Upper Largo
Hotel.

Large Cannon

A large cannon which belonged to the Royal George when she sank off Spithead in August 1782 and which was recovered last year, has lately been sent down from Portsmouth to General Durham, and is now placed in front of Largo House, Fifeshire. It is a 32 pounder and weighs nearly 3 tons. It bears the marks of having lain upwards of half a century in the bottom of the deep.

Largo Pier: Where we were and where we are

In the previous edition of *Largo Links*, I mentioned the massive efforts made to restore the Pier following the damage sustained in 1926. Fund raising activities were many and varied, ranging from Life Saving and Diving Displays to the Pierrott Shows. In 1935, Mr O'Reilly and the "Serenaders" were performing.

So where are we now at the beginning of 2022 with the repair and restoration work? Good progress is being made by the Consultant Engineers and Quantity Surveyors on the completion of the RIBA Stage 3 Document, scheduled for the end of March. This is absolutely essential before we can proceed with applications for major grant funding. We have been successful in our applications for smaller grants receiving £15,500 from the Crown Estates and £4,950 from the Levenmouth Reconnected Scheme. We have engaged Consultants to assist with our major grant funding applications and the Pier Group are currently working on a further application to Levenmouth Reconnected for a much larger sum.

Childhood memories of the Railway

As we await the return of the railway, at least as far as Leven, the *Largo Links* team thought it would be interesting to publish any stories anyone might have about the railway when it ran through Lundin Links and Lower Largo.

I was brought to Lundin Links each July from the age of 3, for my summer holidays, in the few years before the Beeching cuts removed the railway and consigned the viaduct to a mere architectural curiosity.

We stayed in one of the houses on Woodlands Road that overlooked the railway and the viaduct. It was only a few yards away on the other side of a creosoted fence, as was the signal that controlled access to the viaduct.

We had trains running behind our house at home, but they weren't as close as these and we didn't have a signal at home to let us know when a train was coming and so this was one of the things I always looked forward to seeing, and it has remained one of my clearest memories, (along with the smell of the creosote on the fence).

My brother and I would hear a clanking noise and run to the window to wait, or if we were playing in the garden and heard it we'd run out to the fence. The signal would be up. Was the train in the station, or was it coming from Leven? All too soon, the train had gone, a few minutes later the signal would clang back down, bouncing a few times before coming to a rest, and we'd return to what we were doing until the next time.

Developers Fail To Make Hotel Safe

Despite repeated requests from the local Community Council and Fife Council, developers have failed to make the Lundin Links Hotel safe. The iconic Tudor style structure of the Lundin Links Hotel has been left derelict for several years by Developers since the hotel closed and has been allowed to fall into disrepair.

Peter Aitken, Chairman of LACC said:-

"We have now asked Fife Council to resecure/reboard the premises and charge the cost to the developers.

On the evening of Sunday 16.01.22 intruders caused damage to the premises and the police had to be called. The word and figures "Satan 666" have been daubed in red paint on the white walls of the interior. Intruders regularly leave the lights on inside the premises. The emergency lighting is still on. Birds fly in and out of the broken windows and the doors are not secure. A tree in the hotel grounds fell on top of a parked car. The hotel was even set on fire one year.

We have discovered that the delay in building the 35 new flats is due to a dispute between the developers and Scottish Water about the cost of a new surface water drainage system as Scottish Water will not allow the existing surface water drainage system to be used. In the circumstances I have suggested to the developers that the matter should be remitted to the Scottish Public Services Ombudsman for adjudication.

Planning Consent was issued for conversion of the hotel to 35 flats years ago but the work has never been carried out. The same developers purchased Greenfield House Alloa from the local Council in 2017. Again planning consent was obtained and again the building was left derelict for several years. Eventually the developers sold it back to the local council. In frustration the Community Council have now asked Wendy Chamberlain MP and Jenny Gilruth MSP to intervene but they are discovering the same difficulty in obtaining responses from the developers. However it is

hoped the pressure from the Community Council, Fife Council, the MP and the MSP will vield results"

There was a meeting of LACC on 17 January. Two extracts from the minutes:

Fife Development Plan:

We have been given advance notice of the upcoming Development Plan consultation which begins early in the New Year but may only go on for eight weeks.

Largo Estate have allowed Campion Homes to survey the field to the north of Selkirk Grove. In the New Year LACC will need to hear the wishes of the community on any proposal.

Leafletting every household could be a possibility or placing a very prominent article in the *Largo Links* magazine, however this is not due out till March.

It may be that, if the Local Development Plan states that more housing is needed in the area, we should try to identify bits of land that we would prefer to be developed.

We will get the chance to put in representations when the time comes but until then we can be coming up with possible suggestions as to the wishes of the community, e.g., the site at Selkirk Grove is the gateway to the East Neuk, there would be a loss of greenbelt and there is a strong wish to retain the identity and character of our village.

Next meeting of LACC: 21 February

ForthWind Turbine

Mr. Aitken contacted ForthWind Ltd to clarify the important points of the offshore demonstration project at Methil. There will be only one turbine and one mast. The proposed development will last for 25 years from the date that the turbine is first commissioned. The meteorological Mast however will only be in place for 5 years and there is provision in place for decommissioning.

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Update from Largo Estate

Over the Winter the Largo Estate Horticulture Team have continued work in the Walled Garden to prepare it for another growing season. This year we are aiming to make 40 veg boxes available for purchase locally and we will begin running volunteer sessions inviting folk to join us in the garden to learn about our ecological growing methods. Most of our current vegetable beds have been cleared, composted and covered over to protect them from the elements. We begin sowing seeds for the garden in late February all the way through to September and are very excited to use our new propagation tunnel for this purpose!

We will use the large cropping poly-tunnel to grow delicious fruiting crops such as tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, aubergines, chillies, and beans. We are even hoping to try out a few melons. Watch this space! Some of our flower crops will also reside here too. If you'd like to be one of the lucky folk who gets to enjoy Largo grown tomatoes and cucumbers you can sign up for subscriptions to our produce by emailing <code>sales@largoestate.co.uk</code> and through our website in due course.

The flower plot is set to double in size with Erin and Lindsey's planning and we are working on propagating more perennials this year such as Echinops, Astrantia, Astilbe and more varieties of Rudbeckia than we knew we needed! We are beginning to consider how to incorporate shrubs into the garden and planning for long term ornamental plantings that offer foliage for the flower enterprise and that also gives a nod to the original formal beauty that the garden would have once had. We will continue to sell a limited number of arranged bouquets through our website and are hopeful to establish connections with florists across Fife who are particularly interested in sustainable practices.

We have also started work in the walled orchard to put pathways in place so that people can access some of this area if visiting to collect their veg and flower orders, or if attending one of our planned open days. We are active on social media, aiming to share about our work and keep folk updated on the project's progress, so please do have a look at some of our work there too.

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The Largo Lockdown Archive ...

I recently had the pleasure of chatting with Kate McLeod, Largo Library Committee member, regarding the Largo Lockdown Archive initiative to capture and preserve how local individuals have been touched by the global Coronavirus pandemic.

We all hear, on a daily basis, the infection, hospitalisation and mortality statistics, how each government is responding to the scientific guidance and what that means for our daily lives, and how the vaccine programme is hopefully minimising the long-term impact. However, we don't hear very often the personal stories of how Covid-19 has, and still is impacting, local communities and local people; how they're coping, how their lives have changed whether for the better or for the worse, or what will be their most abiding memories.

Records and photographs from the last pandemic, the Spanish Flu, in 1918 have, to some degree, given a picture of what life was like for those affected then but they're not comprehensive. For this pandemic The National Archives will once again be capturing and preserving the national picture, however, to get a more granular view of personal stories of the ordinary man, woman and child it takes a local initiative to plug that gap. The prevalence of social media platforms and modern technological devices now affords us, as individuals, the ability to be a 'citizen archivist'. We can capture how we have been affected by this pandemic on a more personal level that might otherwise be lost forever, or never captured at all.

Within our community we have seen some great projects starting up that might never have happened were it not for the Coronavirus. This newsletter for a start was born out of a desire to keep everyone connected and abreast of community developments in the wake of complete isolation, and the Swans of a Beach launched their sea swimming group in the hope that the well-documented effects of open water swimming on mental health and well-being would help residents cope on a psychological level. However, there is much more going on in our community that is worthy of capture, no matter how insignificant it may seem.

Kate McLeod, a researcher with considerable experience dealing with emotions and the effects of loss and change, raised the notion of creating a local Covid-19 archive within the community of Lundin Links and Largo, with the Largo Library Committee. The Largo Lockdown Archive project is now seeking to crowdsource content, by asking you, our local residents, to submit something that represents you and the pandemic.

How has Covid-19 affected you? Have you joined a group? Done any voluntary work? Started a new hobby, or taken up an old one? Learnt to play an instrument, or a new language? Moved home? Started a new job, or lost one? Made new friends or lost some? Spent more time in your garden, or in your house? Or has there been a moment during this pandemic that will forever be etched in your memory?

... You and the Pandemic!

The format can be anything. It could be represented in artwork, poetry, creative writing, personal stories, photographs, videos, journals. They can be any size or any length. What you choose to submit is entirely up to you as it represents 'You and the Pandemic'.

For me, apart from moving to Lundin Links in November of 2020, one of my most defining moments was with my toddler son during a local indoor sports class just after the second lockdown. He came running up to me, pulled down my mask, kissed me and then pulled the mask back over my mouth and nose. It was a fleeting moment but for me captured, so concisely, how a two-year-old understood his world and my obligations. I wonder how he will look back on this in ten – or twenty – years. This will form part of my submission to the archive.

Should we ever be in the unfortunate position of such a pandemic occurring again in the future, an archive, such as this, will help to give hope and comfort to those living through it. Hope that human resilience and determination to survive and thrive by any means will prevail. The future needs to learn from the past. Let us be a vessel to channel our experiences and make them available to our descendants so it may enrich their lives and shine a light on ours.

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Medical Research

In March 2021 the law regarding organ and tissue donation changed in Scotland to the "opt out" system. However, you may not be aware that you can donate your whole body for research purposes and this does require registration.

It's a simple process and your bequest will help medical, dental and science students to learn about the structure and function of the human body, contribute to the education and training of healthcare and allied professionals and aid research projects. If accepted (almost always the case), all arrangements are made by the university.

Once all research has been completed (usually within 3 years of death) your body is cremated and the ashes made available to friends and family. A service is held each year at the University Chaplaincy for the friends and family of all donors cremated that year. Contacts:

Resilience in the Largo Communities

We hear the word "Resilience" used on a regular basis these days; from reality TV stars on their "journey" to reach the series finale, through nations standing up to foreign aggressors to the global response to pandemic disease. In short, it means many things to many people. A useful definition is "the capacity of an individual, community or system to adapt in order to sustain an acceptable level of function, structure and identity"; but what does that actually mean? On an individual level we demonstrate our resilience on a daily basis; we somehow manage to get through each day regardless of what the world throws at us; no hot water for that quick shower before work, the car won't start, bus is running late, the kids are ill or the school's closed and we need to organise childcare within the hour. The very epitome of individual resilience is the former resident of Lower Largo Alexander Selkirk, who managed to adapt well enough to survive for over four years alone on a deserted island. For most of us, whilst it's unlikely we'll have to deal with such an extreme scenario, we overcome most things that could spoil our day by a little bit of pre-planning and having an informal back up plan in place. At a systemic level, society follows a similar pattern. At a regional, national and international level, we depend on our governments to consider what could go wrong, what impact it could have, who might be affected and if we can't find a way to prevent it happening, how we can

mitigate the effects. Ultimately, that's why we have our precious emergency services such as Police, Fire, Ambulance and Health Services, and organisations such as the Scottish Environment Protection Agency.

When it comes to community resilience, we've seen over recent years that there can be gaps in our preparedness; importantly this is not something which is unique in any way to the Largo villages but exists across the country, in fact across the world! Where things affect wide geographical areas, for example severe weather events, emergency service resources can be stretched and through necessity, will be allocated on a priority basis focusing on those areas at most risk or in greatest danger, meaning that there may be times when we have to come together and fill those gaps.

As a community we can become more resilient by applying the same principles set out above at individual and systemic levels; a bit of forethought and a bit of planning!

Over the last two years, the work of the Largo Area Covid Response Team (LACRT) is a good example of this type of community resilience. The team has developed a range of support for the Largo area communities to supplement existing services; examples are the telephone befriending service, the Support to Connect signposting service and the Support in times of need fund, providing financial support with essentials for those in need.

Resilience (cont)

As the effects associated with Covid begin to subside, the LACRT aim to broaden their role; to identify what gaps exist in the preparedness of our community and to develop a plan to help fill those gaps to improve our resilience as a community in future. This work can't, and mustn't, be done in isolation however; we need to do this together! We have done some work already, taking account of existing National and Regional Risk assessments which have been carried out, we know what some of the likely impacts are. In order to develop this further we're looking for your help; we'd like you to tell us what events have taken place historically which have impacted on you, your family, your business or your village and what we, as a community could do help lessen that impact. We're not here to fight fires or chase criminals, we leave that to the experts, but as set out above, we want to give some thought to what we CAN do, and plan accordingly.

We'll be asking for your views as part of the Community Consultation taking place over the coming months, but we'd also like you to get in touch directly using the email address above.

Together we can make ourselves more resilient as a community!

Watching our figures

After Christmas and with the possibility of summer holidays again, it's the time of year that some of us start looking at our figures again. The LACRT too has been looking at its figures, but in this case it's the statistical ones, not our waistlines. Over the course of the pandemic, team members have been given a weekly statistical report on the number of new Coronavirus cases, hospitalisations and deaths, both locally and nationally. In Scotland, figures are broken down as far as neighbourhoods, and we can see how the number of cases in Largo might compare with Leven or Kennoway for example, or our bigger cities. Early on in the pandemic it was rare for any team member or their friends or relatives to have had direct contact with the virus, but that soon changed and the Largo communities have sadly suffered their share of morbidity and mortality. Keeping the team up to date helps planning both the type and scale of our response to the virus, and allows informed discussion on the safe development of our projects including the helpline, essential food deliveries, our befriending service, support to Happy Beaches, local schools and food banks to name but a few. With the successful rollout of vaccination and boosters, we could see that despite the surge in new cases, there were far fewer hospital admissions and deaths than might have been expected.

Statistics won't stop the pandemic, but can act as an early warning for emerging new strains, and can highlight the success and relative safety of the immunisation programme and counter the deliberate misinformation that still abounds.

Upper Largo Telephone Box

Many iconic red telephone boxes across the country have been refurbished and repurposed for use into mini community hubs. British Telecom, in cooperation with Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT), have offered opportunities of adopting these historic structures to repurpose in ways important to the communities through their Adopt a Kiosk programme. The phone box on St Andrews Road, Upper Largo had fallen into a state of dangerous disrepair and was leaning at an unsafe angle. LACRT decided to apply to CHT to adopt the structure for community use, and to transform it into a phone box to be proud of.

Funded through LACRT's Civic Pride grant from Development Trust Scotland, the telephone box has been renovated to a high standard by Alan Moffat and his team member, Seamus. It is now on a firm base with lining, shelving, electricity and USB point. Coats of bright shiny red paint on its exterior.

As well as housing important public health and resilient community information, LACRT has discussed with Kirkton of Largo Primary School how the space could be used by the children for project work. the children are very excited about the prospect of using the phone box. They will be discussing and sharing their ideas with LACRT very soon. Thanks are expressed to all of those involved in the restoration of the phone box and in its future use as a mini community hub.

disabled people who use a powered wheelchair. The side entrance has a short flight of steps, and a two-inch doorstep and a tight, right-angled turn at the Main Street



entrance. The pavement had no dropped kerb, making it even more inaccessible. Undeterred by these difficulties, Helen and David set about finding a solution. As Helen used to work at Leuchie House, the National Respite Centre in North Berwick, she understands the importance of inclusion. She has worked extremely hard to make it accessible in time for Largo Arts Weekend. That hard work finally paid off, and Kitty Walker was the first wheelchair user to cross the threshold. Kitty is a regular guest at Leuchie House and has known Helen for many years. She's been restricted to the outdoor seating area all summer so she was delighted be able to see the inside. "It looks fantastic inside. I'm really grateful to everyone at The Aurrie, and especially Helen, for making it so easy for me to get in. We'll definitely be back regularly".

On their Facebook page, Helen posted, "It's so important to us that everyone can enjoy the space inside".

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John Ripley, VC (1866 - 1933)

Corporal John Ripley originally came from Keith and then Montrose but spent most of his working life at St Andrews as a slater and chimney sweep. He survived the war and now lies in Largo Cemetery with his wife Jane Laing and her family. He was buried with full military honours in 1933. Before retiring John Ripley

was a soldier of the Black Watch Territorials for 18 years. When war was declared in 1914, he initially worked as a recruiting sergeant. Soon, he recruited himself. Despite the upper age limit for enlisting being 41, he volunteered for active service - at the age of 47. After training Cpl Ripley was sent to join the 1st Battalion The Black Watch Regiment and by February 1915 he was in the trenches of France. After action at Rue du Bois to the south of Neuve Chapelle on 9th May he was awarded the highest possible military honour, the Victoria Cross. The Regiment was bogged down after several attacks to scale the German lines without success. Cpl Ripley led the final assault and reached the enemy parapet which he scaled and from where he directed troops into the gaps in the German wire defences. With seven or eight men he managed to gain a position which he continued to hold until all his men had fallen and he himself had been badly wounded in the head. He never completely recovered from his wound, it left him deaf in one ear and he was



unable to regain his former alertness. Cpl Ripley was one of the oldest recipients to receive the Victoria Cross. By the year 2000 the grave of John Ripley and the Laing family had fallen into disrepair, the headstone was chipped and had become separated from its plinth. The most recent inscription on the headstone was 1939.

The Largo Area Community Council made every effort to find a family member but alas without success, so they took on responsibility for each stage of repair. Stuart Mackie of Glenrothes had served in the Black Watch and volunteered to carry out remedial work that included remounting the headstone on to the plinth. After contacting the Black Watch and gaining the regiment's financial help, the grave was returned to its original condition with the addition of a sculptured inscription on the plinth that denoted John Ripley's name and his award.

On a rainy Saturday 20th October 2001 a service of rededication took place conducted by the Regimental Chaplain Revd Alex Forsyth. Also present were representatives from the Community Council, the Colonel of the Regiment, several branches of the Black Watch Assoc. including Army Cadets and veterans from Forfar together with members of the Largo community. A piper from the 51st Highland Regiment played a lament.



You sent us the article which will appear in the March issue of Largo Links, and asked if we had anything to add. The Black Watch's magazine, Red Hackle, notes that a ceremony was held in Keith (Corporal Ripley's birthplace) on the centenary of the action leading to his award. Those participating included a party from The Black Watch battalion at Fort George and members of the Inverness Branch of the Association. In the presence of the Vice Lord Lieutenant of Banffshire, and with many onlookers, the ceremony was introduced by Councillor Wright, convener of Moray Council. John Ripley's great-great nephew, Mr Stephen Ripley, spoke about Ripley's life and times and Lieutenant General Sir Alistair Irwin then told the story of the action that led to the award. A commemorative stone was unveiled.

You may also wish to know that a similar ceremony was held in Guardbridge, Fife. It was in honour of Corporal David Finlay, who won a VC on the same day during the same action.

Traffic Calming Measures in Lundin Links

So far, the new speed bumps have had a bad review in local social media and specifically in the Lundin Links and Largo Community pages a few examples of which are listed below:

- Poorly thought out. Hardly a welcome to the East Neuk of Fife on the Fife coastal road with 13 speed bumps and a rundown hotel.
- These speed and constant safety concerns raised by many both residents and pedestrians walking up to the village from the bridge or taking their life in their hands still trying to cross to Mill Wynd.
- Already witnessed quite a few drivers swerving to avoid the bumps as well as experiencing the increased noise and fume pollution from stop starts and the loud bangs when large empty trucks cross them. Goodness knows what visitors now think of our village.

There was a consultation process and the Community Council published a notice in this magazine (Feb 2021) outlining options.

- If the numerous residents who have put posts on social media after the calming measures were installed had contacted the Community Council after the Largo Links article their views could have been taken into consideration.
- The profile /shape of the most recent "speed bumps" appear to be different from the earlier ones and are likely to cause damage to smaller road vehicles passing over them at even 15mph
