





#### The Forth, 21 November, 1918

Many people who "know" about these matters think that the German High Seas Fleet surrendered in Scapa Flow. Even the Wikipedia article about the history of this fleet mentions that *HMS Cardiff* 'led' the High Seas Fleet to internment in Orkney.

The actual surrender took place in the Forth. It was in Aberlady Bay, directly South from Largo Bay. It was a misty November day, but surely anyone in Largo would have been out to view what they could of the largest fleet the world had ever seen.




One source states that: by noon the German main fleet was anchored in six lines between Kirkcaldy Bay and Aberlady Bay. Admiral Beatty made the order that: the German Flag was to be hauled down at sunset and not hoisted again without permission. In fact, the German Imperial flag was raised once more, on June 21, 1919. It was the final act of defiance as the High Seas Fleet was scuttled at Scapa Flow.



The bowling season is now well under way, and we are looking forward to some social events as well.





## Penny & Black

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#### Largo Bay

The great sweeping curve of Largo Bay lies between Levenmouth to the west and Kincraig Point to the east. The Largo villages sit behind the centre of the bay with Largo Law as their backdrop. The Victorians were given to describing Largo Bay as "a rival to the Bay of Naples" to attract visitors. The two settings may have similarly sized bays, each boasting a twinpeaked volcano, however, their characters are entirely different. Rather than featuring a large city, Largo Bay offers respite from city life for visitors and tranguillity for locals. From the sea bathing to sailing or simply admiring the view from the shore, the bay offers many leisurely pursuits. But its amenities don't end there. Over time, Largo Bay has provided a source of income to many whether that be fishing, transport, salt making or artistic inspiration. Being more sheltered than the high seas, the bay provides a site for boats to safely drop anchor. It has also offered a secure place for military practice manoeuvres and for the storage of oil rigs taken out of operation. Nevertheless, on occasion, Largo Bay has briefly become a place of peril. One wreck recorded in Largo Bay was the Norwegian schooner 'Rap' of

Stavanger. In 1911 it was wrecked at Lundin Links during a storm but



thanks to the rocket apparatus of the Leven Coastguard no lives were lost. Whether you cast your lines in Largo Bay, paddle in the shallows, capture its seascape with a paint brush or just enjoy a glimpse of it through your window, you will likely agree that there is no need to compare it to Naples or any place else.

#### No coach to Cupar ...

David Anderson, who was for 66 years the minister in Ceres, wrote that he arrived in Fife on an April day in 1840:

I left Edinburgh on the Saturday to go to Ceres by the steam boat, which sailed from Newhaven chain pier in the forenoon to Largo, enjoying for the first time the view of various towns on the Fife shore – Dysart, Buckhaven, &c. There was no coach to Cupar when I arrived in Largo, and I had, therefore, to walk to Ceres, carrying my carpet bag.

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#### **Signs of Spring**

As daylight hours lengthen and we welcome warmer weather, albeit sometimes wetter, the fresh green scents, colourful sights and uplifting sounds of birdsong have awakened from winter's slumber.


In hedgerows and scrubland, the white flowers of Blackthorn burst through before the leaves, whereas on Hawthorn their Mayflowers come after. Sweetscented Apple and Cherry blossoms also hang heavily on the boughs, whilst the towering Oaks begin to unfurl their leaves. Before the dense canopy creates dappled shade on the swathe of Bluebells on the woodland floor, there's still opportunity to spot many species amongst the branches and challenge yourself on birdsong identification. The resident Great Tits, Robins and Song Thrushes are now joined by summer visitors such as Blackcap, Willow Warbler and the early arriving Chiffchaff.

Seabirds have also returned to our shores, with the Isle of May hosting Guillemot, Razorbill and the much-loved Puffin. Terns have also arrived with breeding colonies also on the May as well as on the mainland. The squeaky call of Sandwich Terns can be heard as they fly up and down the coast, diving into the water for small fish. Gannets, locally nesting on Bass Rock, also move considerable distances to find food and the dramatic feeding frenzies are quite a spectacle and if you're lucky, can be seen close to shore.

The Editorial Team found it almost impossible to choose one from these four: so we decided to put one on the cover and show you the other three. Please write and tell us which you would have chosen, and why.

#### **Old Largo House**

To be let by way of publick roup at Largo House on Friday the 11th day of December instant.

The mansion house, office houses, and pigeon house of Largo, with the gardens and enclosures thereto pertaining, extending to about 26 acres of ground all well enclosed with stone and lime dyke; As also a small labouring of about 40 acres of ground lying contiguous to the said house and parks. The house consists of nine fire-rooms besides closets, and is pleasantly situated within half a mile of the sea, two miles Eastward of the town of Leven, on the coast of Fife. The tack may be for 11 or fewer years, as parties can agree, and the tacksman may have the Kains\* and Carriages of the estate. The

tacksman can enter to the possession immediately.

N.B. On which day also the remains of the household furniture will be sold off.

Caledonian Mercury 1/12/1741

Notes: This refers to the lease or tack of the old mansion house of Largo or castle which was built by Sir Andrew Wood, of which only one tower and a large section of wall now remains. It sat a few yards behind the present ruined Largo House. The present Largo House, whose ruins were pictured in the February 2021 edition of this magazine, was commissioned in the early 1750's by James Durham (1732 -1808)

Kain\* in old Scots law, this was a rent paid in kind, e.g. in poultry, to a landlord.

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

#### **The Admiral**

This is a book by Nigel Tranter and it is a fictionalised life of Sir Andrew Wood, who was Admiral to James III and James IV. There is a model of one of his ships, The Yellow Carvel, in Largo Kirk.

The cover picture of *Largo Links* is of Largo Bay, so we thought that our readers might be interested in this book. On its first page, we meet the young Andrew Wood, looking over the bay:



"The young man gazed out from the eastern horn of Largo Bay, as so often he did. Great was the prospect south, east and west, across the Forth estuary, to the mighty rock-stack of the Craig of Bass sixteen miles off, rising out of the sea backed by the conical hill of North Berwick Law, westwards to the distant heights of Arthur's Seat, Edinburgh Castle and the Pentland hills ...

"Frequently, Andrew came here to gaze, however much his good mother declared that he should be doing other things more useful, tending their sheep on Largo Law, aiding her brother at La'hill Mill, working for their kinsman, Sir John Lindsay at nearby Pitcruvie Castle ..."

#### Lt Col WH Anderson, VC

Lieutenant Colonel William Herbert Anderson (known as 'Bertie') was born in Glasgow in 1881. He had a privileged upbringing sharing time with his three brothers between their parents' home at Strathairly, Upper Largo and a town house in Glasgow. He served in the army for almost 8 years until his marriage to Gertrude Campbell.



yard in force. Col Anderson again led the counter-attack in person and showed disregard for his own safety. Although the counter-attack succeeded the Col lost his life in the action, he died within the enemy's lines. He is buried in the cemetery at

He is buried in the cemetery at Marincourt, Somme. His name is inscribed on the Largo War


In September 1914 William Anderson was recommissioned as a Captain and served with distinction for most of the war but was invalided home during 1917. However, he again returned to France, and a year later he was Commanding Officer of The 12<sup>th</sup> Battalion Highland Light Infantry. He died in battle on 25<sup>th</sup> March 1918 age 36.

Lt Col William Anderson was awarded a posthumous Victoria Cross that is on display to the public at the Imperial War Museum, London. His citation tells us that: the enemy attacked a position in a wood held by the Battalion with the real danger that their whole position would be overrun. Seeing this danger Col Anderson made his way across open ground in full view of the enemy, he managed to gather what remained of 2 companies and then personally led the counter-attack and drove the enemy from the wood, capturing 12 machine guns and 70 prisoners and so restored the original line.

Later the same day, the enemy had penetrated the outskirts of the village (Marincourt) and were holding a timber Memorial.

In fact, Bertie Anderson was William and Nora Anderson's fourth and final son to die in the Great War.

Captain Charlie Anderson, also of the HLI, had been killed in action on 19 December 1914 during fierce fighting in northern France. He was 26. Second Lieutenant Ronnie Anderson, also of the HLI, had been killed in action on the Western Front on 8 October 1915. He was 31. Teddie, the youngest boy, who transferred from the HLI to the Royal Flying Corps, died on 16 March 1918 from the multiple wounds that he received the previous day when crashing during a test flight over Hampshire. He was 21.

No one can help but be distressed by the media cover of the Ukrainian War. There is a feeling of helplessness among us. As a caring community we want to do



Government? Could the government funding be enhanced by financial pledges from the members of our community not only giving a home but quality of life? This is

whatever we can to alleviate the horror being rained down upon our fellow human beings on mainland Europe.

The Largo community has already stepped up to the plate in fund-raising, material and financial giving, and the offer to host Ukrainian families. As a Community is there more to be done? We think so! The Chairs of LCT(Largo Communities Together), LACC (Largo Area Community Council) and LACRT (Largo Area Community Response Team) have been taking advice from our MP, MSP, Councillors and officers at Fife Council. The Scottish Government has developed and financed the Super Sponsor Scheme and it is the responsibility of local Councils to implement the scheme called "Homes for Ukrainians".

Local Councils expect the Hosts to aid the families with Community integration but we as a Community believe we can do more. Could we support a Ukranian family or families in Largo by giving them a home using the financial support by the Scottish what is currently being explored. Additionally there is an opportunity for us to design an infrastructure where we can organise community support for both Hosts and Guests and work in tandem with the statutory and voluntary sectors. We want Ukrainian families who find themselves in Largo to be welcomed, supported, have access to health, housing, finance, education and employment, build upon language skills and develop friendships.

We hope to hold a Community Awareness-Raising meeting to test the level of support available locally and will advertise this widely when we have all the information to hand.

You will understand the situation is a complex one. Bureaucracy is not our friend, but neither is it a blocker to us doing the right thing and that's what we're trying to do ..... watch this space ..... we'll keep in touch.

#### Homes For Ukrainians

Many of you may have offered rooms in your own homes (or holiday homes or second homes) to Ukrainian refugees under the Homes for Ukraine Scheme.

The Community Council are gathering information on the number of rooms available for refugees in Largo Area and whether accommodation has been offered

to adults and/or children to enable us to coordinate the provision of health education and other services for the refugees.

For example, it will help schools and GPs to know how many refugees will require these services.

#### Land At Largo Road/Durham Wynd And To The North Of Selkirk Grove

 A number of residents in Donaldson's Court Durham Wynd and Castaway Lane Lower Largo have requested that the above land remain agricultural land, that the above land be designated a Special Landscape Area and that the above land not be allocated for housing for the following reasons:-

- to ensure that the greenfield entrance to Lower Largo is kept intact.
- to ensure that the flood plain provided by the above land is not lost causing flooding to the village.
- to ensure that "lineal creepage" does not occur towards Upper Largo.
- To ensure that development of the above land does not result in development of the field in front of Largo House.
- 2. The Community Council have a statutory duty to consult the whole of the community in Largo Area on the above for your views and we shall be glad to hear from you.
- 3. In particular we wish to know your views on the following:-
  - the provision of affordable housing.
  - the maintaining of the school rolls at:
    - i. Lundin Mill Primary School.
    - ii. Kirkton of Largo Primary School.
    - iii. Waid Academy.
  - the infrastructure including roads, traffic and safety, cycle paths, footpaths, sewerage etc

#### Largo Arts Week 2022 – Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> - Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> July

Largo Arts Week (LAW) is now a firmly established annual event held in the third week of July each year. Preparations for this, the third LAW, are well underway and it promises to be a wonderful week of arts, crafts, music, conversation and family events.





This issue of *Largo Links* coincides with the launch of Largo Arts Week 2022 in the national press, the publication of the LAW brochure and the updated website, where details of all exhibitors, studios, events and ticketing requirements can be found. See us at:

Reflecting the ethos of LAW to be an inclusive event for the community as well as for the many visitors, and a vehicle for the nurturing of local talent, this year's festival is timed to coincide with the Largo Bay Arts Club annual exhibition, and welcomes 20 participants exhibiting for the first time as part of the Open Studios. Expect to see some 70 local artists and makers in their studios along with a few pop-up exhibitors, across the three villages. In Upper Largo The Stables will host a group of 6 artists and makers from a bit further afield representing the creative collective "Made in Fife". This brings Upper Largo firmly into the fold of LAW, but still keeps the whole event small, manageable and inclusive of the whole community. Note that this year there is no single central hub for activities and events, but three venues, also providing food and drink – The Crusoe, The Aurrie and the Upper Largo Hotel.

There will be music by local bands, covering genres such as blues, bluegrass and retro 80's, with the welcome return, too, of Fifers Rab Noakes and Charlotte Whittle. Many music events will be free, you may just need to book a table at the relevant venue, but in the spirit of inclusivity and community involvement no-one will be turned away.



There will be more family events this year, the prize painting competitions and a free outdoor concert at the harbour, generously supported by Andy's Shop and the Crusoe. And it wouldn't be LAW without one or two well-known celebrities. The festival will be bookended by appearances of two of Fife's greatest crime writers "in conversation with....." at the Crusoe – Val McDermid, and Ian Rankin (also with the involvement of Richard Jobson from the Skids).

We once had a Prime Minister represent us in the Westminster Parliament. Herbert Henry Asquith was elected as a Liberal MP for the East Fife Constituency in 1886. In

that year, he presented this photograph to Mr W. Gillies, his agent in Largo. He was Home Secretary (1892-95) and Chancellor (1905-1908) before becoming Prime Minister (1908-16). In the middle of the war, he was replaced by Lloyd George as PM, and he lost his re-election to Parliament in the 'khaki election' of 1918. Asquith died in 1928, and his tombstone reads: *Earl of Oxford and Asquith, Prime Minister of England*. Bill Bryson (an American author who has lived in Britain for many years) commented: *... a man whose descendants had apparently forgotten exactly what he was Prime Minister of ...* 

#### Tolls

In 1872, there was a toll between Largo and the station, and another between Largo and Lundin Links ... They paid 1s for a carriage and pair of horses, 6d for a cart and one horse, and 4d for a riding horse ... "It was an awful nuisance, especially coming home late, after the toll-keeper had gone to bed, and we had to knock him up and he took a long time to come, sometimes."

In 1883, the roads were taken over by the Road Trust, and tolls were stopped.

This information comes from the *Largo Village Book* (1932). It may be consulted in the Library.



#### **The Arts Society Fife**

The Arts Society Fife held its first lecture back in The Corn Exchange, Cupar on 12th April, This was the first time we had been in the hall since March 2020 (lectures since then having been hosted online). Paul Atterbury came to talk to us about "Arts and Crafts Ceramics". Many of you will know him from his appearances on the BBC's "Antiques Roadshow" and will be aware he has a wide-ranging knowledge of the arts which includes a special interest in ceramics. Paul began with a brief history of the arts and crafts movement, this style of ceramics becoming increasingly popular with their appearance in department stores. Although mass produced, each pot had its own individuality. Paul took us around the country, focusing on some of the more prominent potteries and telling us about how the various techniques, glazes and

designs were arrived at. The ceramics we were shown on screen were truly beautiful, made even more so by his explanation of the technical difficulties. Prior to the pandemic, we served teas and coffees after lectures. We have not started back with catering, but hope to do so in June.

The last lecture for this session is on 14<sup>th</sup> June when Simon Seligman is will speak about the treasures of Chatsworth House (this may be subject to change). We start back for our 2022/23 session on Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> September. The lecture programme for 2022/23 is currently being finalised. We are always happy to welcome new members and guests. #### **Homelands Trust Update**

It is an exciting time at Homelands. In August 2021, after 5 years of fund raising, planning and building warrant applications etc. Homelands embarked on its exciting Phase 2 development. This development is now clearly visible from Leven Road (next to the bowling club) where our five new accessible holiday lodges are taking shape. These new lodges will add to our current portfolio of 4 lodges, which are heavily oversubscribed, and will allow us to provide many more respite breaks and holidays for those with disabilities, life-limiting conditions and their unpaid carers. The lodges have been purposefully designed by local architects Hurd Rolland Partnership to accommodate our guests' needs with extra wide doors, zero threshold entrances, full wet rooms and a raft of specialist items such as ceiling tracking hoists and closomat toilets.

The names of the 5 new lodges; Emsdorf, Lundin, Largo, Selkirk and Durham, were chosen by children from Lundin Mill primary school and recognize names in the local community (as per our 4 original Lodges Massney, Keil, Cardy and Drummochy).

Our new lodges are scheduled to be completed by mid-October 2022 and handed over to the Trust to furnish and prepare with a view to their being available for our guests by Christmas 2022.

#### **Largo Communities Together**

What happens around where you live is important to all of us. That is why Largo Communities Together (LCT) and Largo Area Community Council (LACC) have embarked on developing our own Local Place Plan (LPP).

So what is this and what does it do for us?

A Local Place Plan (LPP) is our ideas for what we do and don't want to happen in our communities. It will be lodged with Fife Council. They are duty bound to consult that plan before they make any changes in our Community Assets. To this end we have employed part time, our own Community Development Officer Priya.



#### Silverburn Flax Mill Project

The Silverburn Flax Mill has been granted National Lottery Heritage Funding of just over £3.47 million to bring the derelict building back to life.

A visitor centre, backpackers' hostel, café, artists' studios, community space and a shop are part of the plans to restore the much-loved heritage site as the beating heart of Levenmouth.

The project will also create around 130 jobs, including construction trainee placements for local young people, and roles for people experiencing mental health problems. Activity plans include volunteering activities that will specifically target groups from under-represented communities.



The ambitious five-year community-led project is being delivered by Fife Employment Access Trust (FEAT) and Fife Council and aims to encourage tourism, support local businesses, and provide social prescribing activities for mental health and wellbeing.

The B-listed building, dating from the 1850's, is an important reminder of Fife's central role in the linen industry which ended in the 19th century. Owned by the Russell family until the 1970s, the Silverburn Mill and its 27-acre park on the Fife Coastal Path, was gifted to the people of Leven. Later uses included an animal farm, a craft centre and an events venue. These activities ceased and the buildings closed during the 1990s.

The grant from the National Lottery adds to funding from other donors including: Fife Council (£2 million); Scottish Government (£1.5 million); Historic Environment Scotland (£510,000); and nearly £40,000 generated by the Levenmouth community. FEAT CEO Duncan Mitchell said:

"It's nearly ten years since we started work on proposals to regenerate Silverburn Park and so what a wonderful result from a decade of hard work!"

The planned opening date for the mill is Easter 2026. The Levenmouth Railway Link will also be operational, opening up Leven to visitors from Edinburgh and the South.

Silverburn Park also lies within the Levenmouth to Lundin Links Green Network Area, and contains significant trees and woodland areas, waterbodies and a watercourse. The project will promote the natural heritage of the pond, the wider park and the nearby Fife Coastal Path and shoreline, which is visited by 3.6 million people annually.

The articles on pages 30 - 33 are provided by Priya, on behalf of Largo Communities Together. They all concern matters which LCT wishes to bring to your attention.



#### **Largo Pier**

Those of you who are members of LCT will be aware that the Consultants working on our behalf and assisting us with our fundraising strategy carried out a Community Focused Online survey. I am pleased to advise you that the Consultants reported that they had seldom seen such a strong response to a community online survey and such a high degree of community support and demonstration of need for a capital project. We were very pleased to receive this information and many thanks to all who responded to the survey in such positive terms.

We have now received the final drawings from David Narro, our consulting civil engineers, and we hope to have these available for you to examine at the LCT Open Evening at the Aurrie on 11<sup>th</sup> June. We are now in a position to start making applications for substantial grants from major funders such as the National Heritage Lottery Fund and Historic

Environment Scotland. Obtaining these grants will not be easy and it could be a long and tortuous business. However, we are confident that the restoration of Largo Pier meets many of the conditions set by these bodies. We shall keep you advised of progress.

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#### Cat fish (wolf fish) with mushrooms and wild garlic

Cat fish is an excellent firm fish, ideal for deep frying but I thought that adding a touch of oatmeal gives it a nutty crunch and the mushrooms and garlic add lovely savoury flavours.



INGREDIENTS

4 fillets Cat fish Red onion, finely chopped 1 tsp Trotter's wholegrain mustard

50g medium oatmeal 200g button mushrooms, sliced stard Hand full of wild garlic leaves, shredded Wild garlic flowers to garnish

#### METHOD

- 1. Cut the fish into strips or "goujons"
- 2. Lightly season and roll in the oatmeal
- 3. Heat a pan with a little vegetable oil and butter, and fry the fish on all sides for a few minutes to colour the oatmeal. Set aside, keeping warm.
- 4. Reduce the heat on the pan and add a little more butter and stir in the mushrooms, cook quickly, add the onions and cook briefly to soften them, then stir in the shredded wild garlic and the mustard. Cook gently for a few more minutes and stir to combine.
- 5. Place in the centre of 4 plates and then place the fish strips all over and garnish with the wild garlic flowers.



My new fish book "Coasts and Waters The British seafood cookbook" is as much about using wild fish from our waters as it is about seasonal availability. This month's recipe focuses on a less well known

fish as much as seasonality. I hope you have all been making full use of the wild garlic everywhere – loads in Kiels Den, but in June the plant flowers and these flowers make a very pretty addition to any dish.

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#### **Celebrating 100 Years**

Marguerite Lavinia McDouall's father, John, was a doctor from New Zealand, who trained in Dunedin and studied tropical medicine in Liverpool. For many years he worked in West Africa. On one of his leaves in England, he met Madge's mother, Marguerite. They corresponded for over three years, and married in 1914.

Madge was born in Coomassie in the Gold Coast (now Kumasi, Ghana), but moved to England at just 3 months old. She lived in Dorset and Kent, and went to The High School for Girls, Ashford Kent.

In 1941, Madge married Captain Ian McCormick RAMC and they had three children, Jenny, John & Marguerite. After leaving the Army, Ian's work took the family to Rothesay and Bristol before finally coming to Fife where he was later to become Chief Medical Officer of Chest & Infectious Diseases.

Madge lived in Ceres, Earlsferry, Windygates, East Wemyss and Cupar before moving to Lundin Links in 1951. This was followed by ten years at Balchrystie before returning to Lower Largo in 1972.


Madge has always been a knowledgeable worker, very determined and resourceful. She became a social worker with Fife Council, including a two-year period of unpaid leave. During this time, she funded herself through a qualification course at Jordanhill College.

Madge was never idle. She was a keen gardener and baker. She made her own jewellery and when watching TV or in conversation, she would be knitting. Her son John remembers that Mum made his first ever school blazer.

At her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration, in Monturpie Restaurant, she was joined by friends and by 31 of her numerous descendants: three children, eleven grandchildren and twenty greatgrandchildren.

#### Leslie Hunter

Hunter was a Scottish artist (1877 – 1932) who lived in the USA for many years. His early work was destroyed in a fire following the San Francisco earthquake in 1906, and shortly after he returned to Scotland. Many of his paintings were of Lower Largo. This one is said to have been completed in 1922.
