Old Largo - A History of Lundin Links and the Library

When Largo Library and Community Hub opened its doors in April 2017, the building it occupies was already 160 years old, having been built as Lundin Mill School in 1857 and subsequently converted into Lundin Links Library. When the latter faced closure, a team of volunteers stepped in to take over the service, not only continuing a valuable local amenity but maintaining the long history of learning on the site.

The origins of the building begin back in 1852, when the prospect of the railway reaching Lundin Links enticed the Standard Life Assurance Company to purchase the Lundin and Aithernie Estates.

Their intention was to expand the existing village of Lundin Mill by adding a substantial residential development to the west, capitalising on the sea-views and proximity to the future railway station. Drawn up in 1853, the initial plan involved building nineteen large detached villas and twelve smaller detached villas, positioned along curving streets and interspersed with areas of greenery. The development would also include a hotel adjacent to the railway station, a church close to the hotel and a new school situated between the new buildings and the existing areas of Emsdorf and Drummochy.

The arrival of the railway in 1857 was the catalyst for development to begin. In what was perhaps a tactical move to get locals on side, one of the first actions was to construct a new school house and school master's residence. The school was planned by architect John Milne of St Andrews and

replicated his earlier design for Giffordtown Free Church School, built in 1854.

While the school was duly constructed, the wider development plan failed to materialise, in spite of vigorous promotion, including a full page advert in the 1860 book "The Handy Book of the Fife Coast" by Henry Farnie. By 1862, with only a handful of villas completed, building work ceased.

The reasons behind the failure of the venture most likely included a lack of attractions for tourists beyond the coastline itself (the golf club was not yet established and there were no other sporting facilities in the village), the old fashioned nature of the local shops and inns, and poor provision of utilities such as water and gas supply and sewage disposal. In short, Standard Life's vision was premature and it would be another few decades before the expansion of Lundin Links took off.

The school however thrived, with David Milne Stewart holding the position of headmaster for 37 years from 1868. Several generations of pupils later, the population eventually outgrew the school and the move to the present modern building took place in 1974.

Countless individuals took their memories of the old Lundin Mill School with them and no doubt a good number of them continue to appreciate the old building in its latest guise. Long may the community continue to benefit from the former Victorian school building and the great services it continues to provide.

Warming Autumn Fish Soup Recipe

Based on a bouillabaisse but simplified, this is a tomato soup flavoured with fish.



It is one of those recipes where you can add the pulp from blanched, peeled tomatoes. Ask your fishmonger in advance for fish bones.

Ingredients

- 1 large onion, peeled and roughly chopped
- 1 leek, roughly chopped
- 1 tblsp olive oil
- 1 clove garlic, crushed with salt
- 450g ripe tomatoes
- 2 tsp tomato puree
- 1kg fish bones, white fish preferably not salmon or mackerel
- A strip of orange zest
- Herbs parsley stalks, bay leaf and fennel
- Water
- 150ml white wine
- 800g fish and shellfish
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method

- 1. Sweat the onion and leek in a large pan in olive oil until soft.
- 2. Add the garlic, fish bones and white wine and cook for 5 minutes.
- 3. Tip in the tomatoes, tomato puree, wine and enough water to cover; bring to the boil, adding the herbs and orange zest.

 Reduce heat and simmer gently for about 40 minutes.
- 4. Allow to cool a little, before pushing through a sieve; use the back of a ladle to really get as much liquid out. Return to a large, clean pan, and bring to just below simmering; check for seasoning.
- 5. Cut the fish into similar-sized chunks. Rinse mussels or clams.
- 6. Cooking the fish is simple, just do not let the soup boil! Add the shellfish first, then the larger firm chunks, such as hake or cod and lastly the thinner pieces, such as sole. Just as it comes to the boil, switch off heat and leave for a few minutes. Serve in large bowls with chopped fresh parsley.


How the community can get involved

Scottish Water had to withdraw their plan to introduce chemical dosing to their treatment tank because SEPA deemed it harmful to the local ecology. We are having a meeting with representatives of The Water Board in August where they will go over alternative solutions for improving water quality. Watching the Sea by Gerry Best



Many of us like to come down to Largo Bay and watch the sea. It's mesmerising isn't it? Looking at the tide coming in and watching the waves breaking on the shore. It's different

every day. So, why do the waves tumble over as they reach the shore? It's because, as the wave approaches the beach, its lower part is slowed by the friction of the sea bed but the top part carries on at the same pace and so it tumbles over into a bundle of foamy bubbles. If you look carefully at the approaching waves, you'll notice that, if anything is floating on it, it bobs up and down. That's because it is the wave that moves, not the water.

Waves are formed by the energy put into the water by the wind. The stronger the wind the bigger the waves – but that depends on where the wind is blowing from. Most commonly, our wind comes from the South West, across the Forth from Edinburgh. As that distance is just over 20 miles, the so called 'fetch', there is not a lot of distance for the wind to make the waves. Even with a SW gale, the waves arriving on Largo beach are not very large. However, if we have a South Easterly gale, it's a different story as the fetch is over 100 miles and that makes very big waves – our most damaging storms - the Beast from the East that

crashes against the sea walls by the Sailing Club, and destroys our pier!

As you gaze at the beach, you'll see the tide coming in or going out. The times of high and low tides are so predictable that you can buy tide timetables for the whole year for places like Methil. The tide times are fixed by the circuit of the moon around the earth. In 24 hours, the tide comes in and out twice and it's about half an hour later each time.

The other thing you 'sea gazers' will notice is that the height of the tide varies from day to day and that's because the pull of the moon varies as it circles the earth. One of the highest tides of the year, the so called 'Spring Tides' will be on October 8th this year.

The movement of the tides is from East to West, so a high tide in Anstruther is 15 minutes ahead of us, and at Burntisland, it's 10 minutes later.

For those brave folk that go swimming in Largo Bay, you'll know that the sea is salty. The salt content is much the same the world over, about 32 parts per thousand. In the upper Firth of Forth, it will be less because of fresh water coming in from the River Forth.

It's interesting to note that the salinity of the sea is almost the same as our body fluids. Our distant ancestors came from the sea so maybe that's why we love the sea so much,

It's truly magical, isn't it!

The Priory Singers, the East Neuk's own chamber choir, are inviting membership applications for the Autumn session, beginning on Monday, 22 September.







George Leslie Hunter (1877-1931)


Following on from our article in Issue 19 on the renowned George Leslie Hunter, who along with F. C. B. Cadell, J. D. Fergusson and S. J. Peploe, were known as the Scottish Colourists, Largo Links was contacted by Lyon & Turnbull, Scotland's oldest-established firm of auctioneers based in Edinburgh, to let us know that two of Hunter's paintings of Largo went on sale in June.



"Figures On The Pier, Largo" above, sold for £36,450!

It is not known what first drew Hunter to work in Fife, however between 1919 and 1924 he spent part of each spring and summer in the region. It was during this time that Hunter painted "Figures on the Pier, Largo" and "Boats and Figure, Largo" below, which sold for £17,640.

As explained in the auctioneers descriptions; "Given their intimate scale, they were probably made on the spot in direct response to the views before him, of modest fishing boats moored at Lower Largo harbour".



"Particular attention is paid to the vertical mooring posts, the draw of mooring ropes and the colourful figures arrayed along the pier. The depiction of water in motion is signified by expressive brushstrokes, whilst highlights of bright colour, especially of red, enliven the compositions".

Both paintings passed through the hands of the renowned dealer Alexander Reid, in whose Glasgow gallery, La Société des Beaux Arts, Hunter received his first solo exhibition in 1913.

Reid did much to support Hunter's career, championing him alongside his fellow Colourists in exhibitions mounted in London and Paris, whilst his son, A. J. McNeill Reid, organised a solo exhibition at the Feragil Galleries in New York in 1929.

Holiday Memories 1951, Part 1


As part of LCT's Heritage Project, the following recollection of holidaying in Largo was given by Nora Beveridge (aged 90). Sadly, Nora is no longer with us, which is why it is fantastic that it has been written down to be passed on to future generations. It was written in 2010. Rather than edit it and lose some of the character, it will be published in three parts in this, and the next two issues. I hope you enjoy it as much as I did (Ed).

We first came on holiday to Largo in 1951. Everyone in those days came to rented accommodation or to rooms with attendance. The owners moved out or lived in the back of the house, or in some cases in a bothy in the garden. We stayed at 1 Rockview, Mrs Mawby's and she moved to the wood lined basement.

The Post Office was directly opposite, the windows and doors hung with buckets and spades, fishing nets and saucy postcards which caused great hilarity. There were lots of shops in the village at that time.



Starting from the bridge there was the Rio Cafe run by Davy and Tony Forte (the best ice cream for miles). They always said they were related to Lord Forte - and maybe they were! Next came the Post Office run by Mr and Mrs Welsh, full of shell sculpture souvenirs, then sweetie shop (Maggie Laurie's) and then The Cockleshell Tearooms and The Central Stores run by Margaret and Harry Davis and Eric Wishart in the van. Round the corner were The Co-op and Gould's the grocer. It was an eccentric shop where the butter was kept next to the paraffin, but they were most obliging.



Mr Gould would come round the doors for orders and being told that I was having a swim, came down to the water's edge and wrote down my order as I shouted it to him from the sea!! After Gould's came Mrs Cluny's shop, which sold jerseys and beautiful handmade children's clothes. What is now The Baptist Church Hall was a baker's shop and there was another bakers at the corner of Durham Wynd. Opposite was the fish garage and another at the top of the hill. At the top of The Orry was an antique shop which then became The Marina Café.




