

# Largo Parish Church - some history

2023 marks a significant milestone in the history of Largo Parish Church. It is the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the construction of what appears to be the oldest part of the current building. There are references to a number of altars in the church before construction of the Chancel. This bears a tablet on which is inscribed "Fear God / PB / 1623" in reference to Peter Black, owner of Largo Estate. He is also responsible for the tower (1628) and the Burgerhuys bell (1636).

The Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, The Rev Sally Foster-Fulton, will be visiting Fife between the dates of 23 September and 1 October, and it is hoped that she will visit Largo in commemoration of this 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

There has, however, been a place of worship on this site for a considerable period before this. There is some support for the origin of a church site here in the 9<sup>th</sup> Century, but what is known is that the parish was granted to North Berwick Cistercian Nunnery by Duncan, Earl of Fife (1154-1204). The Church at Largo was consecrated on 17<sup>th</sup> July 1243 by David de Bernham, Bishop of St Andrews.

There were major additions and alterations in 1816/17, 1894/95, 1965 and 2015/17. For the first, Alexander Leslie of Largo was the architect. In 1894/95 Sir John Gilmour of Montrave oversaw the project. Three stained glass windows were installed also in 1894/95: David Gault (a member of the *Glasgow Boys* group of artists) was the architect of one, another was placed by John Baxter of Gilston in memory of his wife and the Wood family filled a new rose window in memory of Sir Andrew Wood, Scotland's great naval hero. In 1965, Larry Rolland was the architect. Fundraising in 2015 was on behalf of the fabric committee, led by Peter Williamson.


# **Meet Waffles!**

# **Year of the 3 Polish Generals**

In 1882, three Polish generals were born: Władysław Anders, Stanisław Maczek and Stanisław Sosabowski. In the Second World War, General Sosabowski was closely associated with Largo House.

Last year, The Polish Consul in Edinburgh organised a visit to various places in Fife where the 1<sup>st</sup> Parachute Brigade undertook training: Kincraig Point, Largo House and numerous coastal fortifications. This will form the basis of a historical trail through Fife, to be named *Sosabowski Way*. It is hoped it will be opened later this year.

In our next issue, a great-grandson of this general will write an article describing some of the military history of his ancestor.

We know there are already so many positive things happening in our area. And this plan isn't about replacing them. Instead, it'll encourage connections across the board and provide the underpinnings and resources where they're needed.

- Housing and Shared Facilities.

# The Jurecki Family

Max (Janek) was born near Katowice, Southern Poland, in 1925 and stayed there until he was 14. Lying about his age, he joined the Polish army in 1939. He was captured by the Germans and fought with them until he managed to escape and rejoin the Polish army.

In 1941 he was stationed in Largo House training to be a paratrooper with the 1<sup>st</sup> Polish Brigade and was there until the war ended.

He then found employment with accommodation at Watson's Bakery at Riverside, Lundin Links. During his years there, Janek being Janek, also took up upholstery to make ends meet. He met local lass Jean Wilson, whom he married in 1954. Jean had relocated from Glasgow to Largo at the start of the war along with her mum, dad and brothers, living at Bass House in Main St, Lower Largo until her marriage. They had 4 children - Richard, Jean, Tanya and Jan. In May 1957 Marie Bethune sold Janek an old garage for £100. He turned it into a café which, with a juke box, and Coca Cola having arrived from the States, became THE place to be for the young people! Later Janek bought Norman Forshaw's newsagent's shop, turning the side garage

He also bought five shops from Dundee to Methil, establishing a hugely successful outside catering business – customers included Margaret Thatcher and the now King Charles. Janek employed multigenerations of families from the villages

into a restaurant / tearoom where people

flocked for the home-made delicious

food.

and beyond, as 20 functions in one night was not unheard of.

In the 1980s Janek was appointed caretaker/manager of the Lundin Links Hotel. The Adam Smith Theatre used the hotel to accommodate big stars including Tom O' Conner, The Batchelors and Cilla Black, and Jean had to iron their shirts! They also started a Bed and Breakfast in Crescent Road, so it was work, work, work. Very occasionally Jean enjoyed a night at the bingo and they managed a few trips away for a foreign holiday or to visit family in Poland.

Jean was a Bridge addict, Champion at the local club for many years and loved puzzles of all kinds, every week sending competitions back to her favourite magazine, never being lucky enough to win although receiving a mention for good attendance! When sadly, Janek died in 1988, and the business with him, Jean moved to a smaller house, making things much easier and giving her more time to enjoy life. Her 4 children still live locally and are a big part of her life. She continued to go to the bingo with son-inlaw Tom and daughter Jean unfortunately, she didn't win there either! Jean will be 90 on 17<sup>th</sup> June and as you can imagine she is not as fit as she used to be, however there is life in the old dog yet!

# The District Nurse

This cottage was mentioned in the March edition of *Largo Links*. Here is a little of the history, told in the *Largo Village Book* of 1932. It states that in the late 1890s:

... Mrs Baxter of Teasses, feeling there was a great need for a nurse to care for the old people and to attend maternity cases, called a meeting of a few of the neighbours likely to be interested. They agreed that a nurse would be a great benefit in the place and so decided to have one. The nurse was supported at first entirely by private subscription but as time went on, and her work increased, and the patients found out how much her work meant to them, they began to contribute too. This rather happy-golucky method went on very successfully until after the War, then it was agreed to form a District Nursing Association, with an annual subscription for members of 5s per annum."

The District Nursng Association submitted plans for the building of the house in 1926. Mrs Paxton of Homelands paid for its construction, and it was handed over in 1927.



# **Asparagus from Peru in January? No thanks.**

Summer is here! And lots to celebrate. I am continuing my theme of seasonality and what to look out for at this time of year. It is interesting how our dynamic farmers seem to bring the seasons forward all the time! As I write this in early May, local asparagus has been

available for some weeks! But really, we are in the full season now for another few weeks and then I will wait again until next year before eating asparagus.

New potatoes will be available now, delicious epicures from Ayrshire and some local farms will have them too. All the

green beans are out now such as broad and French.

Lots of salads as well, tomatoes will be available in July and the summer brings peas and mange tout. So make good use of the varieties. There really is no excuse for buying anything from outwith Fife at this time of year.

Of the fruits, strawberries, raspberries, black currants and gooseberries are all available. Time for fruit tarts and fools. On the fish front mackerel will be plentiful and sea trout is coming into its short season. Do make sure that it is wild, as farmed sea trout is available year-round and is simply not the same! Roe deer buck will be available as the hinds will be looking after their young. But look out also for pigeon and rabbit.

On the wild side, wild garlic will be pretty much over but look out for elderflowers which make a delicious syrup and a sparkling drink. Sorrel will be in good leaf also and it makes a lovely tangy sauce to go with oily fish such as salmon and is good in salads.



There is also a project on the go regarding making use of seaweed, or as I prefer to call them sea vegetables. This is a wonderful nutritious food right on our doorstep. Look out for my presentations.

# From one of our Readers

One of our far-flung readers (Kenny Morrison, from North Berwick) has sent the letter in the next column. It relates to the refurbishment of Woods Hospital following the fire of 1830 (Largo Links, March 2023)

Shotts Iron Works by Whitburn 26 March 1832

Mr Alex Beveridge\*
Sir

General Durham of Largo has desired me to advise you of the prices at which I will furnish beds and grates for the Patrons of Woods Hospital, Largo. I recently made some beds for a Hospital at Lanark which have given great satisfaction and can deliver such beds put free on board ship at Leith as follows say. 1 bed frame with cast iron spar bottom and foot rails 6x3 feet at 45/-, 1 ditto same as above 6x4 at 52/6 and should the patrons prefer to have wrought iron hoop bottoms in place of cast iron bottoms the price will be for the first or 6x3 50/each and for the 2"d 6x4 feet one 58/6 each. A grate consisting of 2 fronts, 2 hobs 1 bottom and a wrought iron breast at 28 inches wide will cost about 10/- each and less or more in proportion to the sizes wanted. Should these prices suit the patrons and an order be forwarded to me they may be assured that every article shall be made in the most substantial manner and a few months more or less credit will make no difference.

# Largo Pier - past & present

Built to enable the movement of goods by sea, Largo Pier supported manufacturing, agriculture and fishing for many a decade. The pier also provided access to an alternative to road travel, prior to the arrival of the railway.

### NOTICE.



On and after Monday 3d April, the ST GEORGE will make Two Trips each day betwixt LARGO and CHAIN PIER. The Hours of Sailing will be—

From LARGO at a quarter before Seven Morning, and half-past Twelve Noon.

From DYSART at Eight Morning, and a quarter before Two Afternoon.

From CHAIN PIER at Ten Morning, and Five Afternoon.

Chain Pier, 28th March, 1837.

However, from its early days the pier's potential for fun as well as function has been evident. Offering space by the water, in the centre of the community, it has been the scene of celebration, entertainment and recreation. From the days when large crowds would gather to welcome back the fishing fleet from their lengthy trips to far-flung fishing grounds, to the era when visitors arrived on steamboat services, the old stone quay

has been about more than just trade and industry.



When the railway reached Largo in 1857, the demand for trade and travel by boat was diluted. Increasingly, a travelling fun fair might compete for space on the pier with the fishing ropes, sails and fish boxes.

During the late 19th century, Largo Swimming Club held galas on the pier, attracting huge crowds to view a variety of races and challenges. As the level of fishing-related activity fell away, use of the pier for leisure grew.

Notably, it became the site of the Pier Pavilion – a temporary seasonal structure that brought entertainment to visitors and locals each season for around three decades, largely between the wars. The harbour area would have echoed with the sound of performances such as musical numbers, comedy, sketches, songs, dancing and ventriloguism.



Largo found itself quite the fashionable seaside resort in the 1920s. A regular visitor was the 'Scottish Colourist' George Leslie Hunter (1877-1931). He sketched and painted many local scenes including several of the pier and of the Pier Pavilion.



The artist even sketched the pier with gaping holes in it following a storm.

During spells of disrepair, the pier still triggered community events. Various Pier Committees oversaw enthusiastic

community fund-raising, which included fetes, concerts, dances, open-air markets and jumble sales. In 1935 a newspaper piece acknowledged that the ever-popular Largo Pier had evolved to serve an entirely different purpose than was originally intended by the founders. The last of the deep-sea fishing fleet had ceased in 1909even the number of smaller boats was dwindling. The pier had become a place to promenade and to enjoy the seaside views and seasonal entertainment. Benches and shelters were erected around the harbour by the community council. Small pleasure crafts now moored alongside the pier.



In recent decades the pier has continued to be a focal point for community events and special occasions, from 'flying off the pier' contests, to Largo Arts Week events. An unforgettable celebration was the 'Crusoe 300' summer of fun across all three of the villages, organised to mark 300 years since the birth of Alexander Selkirk - the Largo-born mariner who spent four years and four months on an uninhabited island, providing the inspiration for Daniel Defoe's *Robinson Crusoe*.



Largo pier still retains the qualities that have made it such a well-used and admired space for over two centuries. By carrying out repairs and making the structure safe, the pier can continue to provide a unique space for the whole community to use and a venue for a diverse range of activities.







- Name of caller and
- Name of patient

- Usual Address
- Age of Patient (date of birth)
- Contact phone number
- Name and address of usual GP if registered in UK

### **Clinical Details:**

- List of medications is very helpful
- Previous medical history
- In order to ensure that they are speaking about the correct patient, you will be asked to give personal details initially to the call-handler and again to the triage nurse.
